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


A. RELATED AGREEMENTS

This project is being carried out under the provisions of the following agreements:

- Denali Commission Financial Assistance Award Project Number 0071-DC-2002-I24, Amendment 1, dated August 2002
- Memorandum of Understanding Between the Denali Commission and the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium for Alaska Rural Primary Care Facilities and Sanitation Facilities Planning, Design, and Construction, dated June 2002

B. SCOPE OF PROJECT

The scope of this project encompasses repair and renovation to the existing community health clinic, specifically, replacement of exterior siding. No new ground disturbance will occur under this project.

C. PROJECT FUNDING

Denali Commission funding for this health facility improvement project has been made available to the ANTHC through a separate Financial Assistance Award (FAA), or amendment to an existing FAA, between the Denali Commission and the ANTHC.

D. PROJECT MANAGEMENT METHODOLOGY

In conformance with the Memorandum of Understanding Between the Denali Commission and the ANTHC for Alaska Rural Primary Care Facilities, and as directed by the Financial Assistance Award of April 2002, the following Project Management Methodology option has been selected by the City of Craig:

Work will be overseen by the City of Craig. The city shall take responsibility for all project oversight, technical assistance, and management of the design. The Consortium will act as the Denali Commission's fiduciary agent in monitoring funds execution and project closeout reports.

TO: FOR THE RECORD

Based upon the scope for this project, an environmental review in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) has been completed. The Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium (ANTHC) has considered all potential environmental concerns (specific and cumulative effects) associated with the project in consultation with applicable federal, state, and local authorities. The Environmental Review Report has been completed and reviewed with respect to the proposed Clinic project.

FINDINGS

The ANTHC uses the Indian Health Service (IHS) environmental review procedures for conducting environmental analyses of all health facilities projects, as outlined in the *Environmental Review Manual*, the second edition of which was issued in January 2000. This environmental review finds that no further environmental investigation is needed because it includes maintenance and every day repairs and replacement, and acquisition of equipment not requiring permits. All actions involving construction have been reviewed and no extraordinary or exceptional circumstances were found to exist. It is therefore recommended that the Denali Commission approve a determination of eligibility for categorical exclusion from the requirement to conduct further environmental evaluation for this project. Current IHS policy (Federal Register, Vol. 58, No. 3, January 6, 1993, pp. 569-572, I [2] and [3]) allows for categorical exclusion of health and sanitation facility projects that do not have a significant impact on the environment.

BACKGROUND

Craig is located on a small island off the west coast of Prince of Wales Island, and is connected by a short causeway. It is 31 road miles west of Hollis. It lies 56 air miles northwest of Ketchikan, 750 air miles north of Seattle, and 220 miles south of Juneau. It lies at approximately 55.47639° N Latitude and -133.14833° W Longitude. (Sec. 06, T074S, R081E, Copper River Meridian.)

The population of Craig, as of December 2001, according to the Alaska Department of Community and Economic Development, was 1,397 people.

ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES OF IMPORTANCE

There are no environmental resources of importance that will be affected by the project.

SCOPE OF WORK


The scope of this project encompasses repair and renovation to the existing community health clinic, specifically, replacement of exterior siding. No new ground disturbance will occur under this project.
