A. RELATED AGREEMENTS

This project is being carried out under the provisions of the following agreements:

- Denali Commission Financial Assistance Award Project Number 0071-DC-2002-124, dated April 2002
- Memorandum of Understanding Between the Denali Commission and the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium for Alaska Rural Primary Care Facilities and Sanitation Facilities Planning, Design, and Construction, dated June 2002
- Cooperative Agreement Between the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium and the Yukon-Kuskokwim Health Corporation for Denali Commission – Alaska Primary Care Facilities Program, dated June 2001

B. SCOPE OF PROJECT

This project will construct a new health clinic facility in the City of Russian Mission, Alaska. The scope of this project includes design and planning, site preparation, materials and equipment, construction, and labor.

C. PROJECT FUNDING

The funding amount of this Attachment is \$636,489.

Denali Commission funding for this health facility improvement project has been made available to the ANTHC through a separate Financial Assistance Award (FAA), or amendment to an existing FAA, between the Denali Commission and the ANTHC.

It is understood that funding transfers will be made to ANTHC incrementally. Project activities should not proceed until funding for each increment of work is available to ANTHC. By signing this document, the sub-recipient is assuring that funding from other contributing agencies, if applicable, shall be made available to the project. If in-kind or other funding sources are unavailable, transfers to the sub-recipient will be curtailed.

The sub-recipient shall not be obligated to continue performance that requires an expenditure of more funds than awarded under this Sub-Award plus funding from other sources as specified in the funding application to the Denali Commission. If the sub-recipient has reason to believe that the total amount required for performance will be greater than the amount of this Sub-Award plus any other funding source amounts so specified as initially available, the sub-recipient shall provide notice to ANTHC within ten (10) days of discovery. If the Denali Commission (or any other funding source) does not increase the funding authorization for the project, the sub-recipient may suspend performance until sufficient additional funds are awarded or complete the project without additional funding assistance through this Sub-Award.

D. PROJECT MANAGEMENT METHODOLOGY

In conformance with the Memorandum of Understanding Between the Denali Commission and the ANTHC for Alaska Rural Primary Care Facilities, dated April 2002, the City of Russian Mission has selected the following project management methodology:

Project design and construction will be managed by the Yukon-Kuskokwim Health Corporation, which has met standards for a "Pass Through" organization approved by ANTHC. ANTHC will only maintain program oversight of the project. No technical assistance or project management will be provided by ANTHC.

E. CONTINGENCY PROVISIONS FOR PROJECT FUNDING

Denali Commission funding is immediately available for project design. However before construction funding may be released and before construction may begin, the Yukon-Kuskokwim Health Corporation must provide proof to ANTHC that the conditions placed on the project by the Denali Commission have been met. The contingencies to be satisfied include but are not necessarily limited to the following:

- The lease agreement required by the Denali Commission has been written for 30 years.
- A plan for funding utility extensions to the project facilities has been completed.
- The HUD grant award documentation for the project has been completed.

Construction funding for the project will not be released until the Commission has confirmed to ANTHC that these conditions have been met.

F. DURATION OF ACTIVITIES – EFFECTIVE DATE OF SUB-AWARD

The project shall be completed by not later than June 2004. To continue activity of this Attachment beyond its completion date, the parties' designated contacts must complete and sign a modification or extension. Activity under this Attachment may be terminated by the terminating party giving fifteen (15) days written notice to the other party. In the event of termination prior to completion, an appropriate reduction in the funding amount will occur, and unexpended Sub-Award funds shall be returned to ANTHC.

The Sub-Award shall take effect upon signature by all parties.

G. PROJECT OVERSIGHT

In accordance with Denali Commission funding conditions, ANTHC will provide project oversight, thereby supporting the scope of work of this Sub-Award.

H. REPORTS

H 1. Report Guidelines

An initial project schedule will be provided to ANTHC and will be updated if changes occur. The schedule will stipulate activities and milestones that are expressed in calendar days and percentage of the project.

The sub-recipient shall submit written progress reports to ANTHC quarterly (January/March, April/June, etc.). The reports are due within 10 calendar days of the end of the quarter so that they may be incorporated into ANTHC's quarterly report to the Denali Commission. Written notification is required in the event of significant project events that may extend the project schedule or impact the project budget. Quarterly progress reports shall include a narrative summary of the project status, the percent of work completed, and accomplishments to date. The narrative shall address the following questions: Is the project on schedule? Is the project on budget? What actions are planned to address any project problems?

Progress schedule and reporting forms will be provided by ANTHC. The Progress Schedule may form the basis for calculation of an advance payment schedule.

The ANTHC may, at any time, request the sub-recipient to provide the progress reports in electronic format for direct posting on the Denali Commission web page.

The sub-recipient shall provide a Final Report for the project to ANTHC within ninety (90) days after project completion. The format and content of the Final Report will be provided by ANTHC in accordance with Denali Commission requirements.

H 2. Quarterly Project Financial Status Reports

Project financial status reports shall be submitted by the sub-recipient to ANTHC quarterly (included as part of the quarterly progress reports). The quarterly financial status report shall illustrate the following:

- The total project budget.
- The total amount of Denali Commission funds committed to the project.
- The total project expenditures as of the end of the most recent quarter.
- The total expenditure of Denali Commission funds for the project as of the end of the most recent quarter based on pro rata share of total contributions (report can be by dollar amount or percentages).

H 3. Final Financial Status Report

A final Financial Status Report shall be submitted to ANTHC not later than 30 days after the end of the Award Performance Period or completion of the project. The Financial Status Report, Standard Form 269, is available at the following website address:

H 4. Labor and Residence Report

A labor type, residence, and wage report shall be submitted to ANTHC two times annually. At a minimum these two reports must be submitted on or near August 1 and December 1 each year to correspond with the Alaska construction season. The report must include the following information for any person employed on the construction project: position, place of primary residence, first check date, last check date, rate of pay per hour, and payroll earnings from inception of the project to date. Personal or confidential information such as name, address, Social Security number, number of persons or other information that would identify an individual should not be included in this report. A sample report format will be provided by ANTHC.

H 5. Photographic Documentation

Photographic documentation shall be provided to ANTHC at the beginning of the project and at project completion. Photo documentation shall include a minimum of five "before" pictures showing the situation before the start of construction, 10 "during" (provided at project completion) showing work proceeding on the project, and 5 "after" to show the finished project. For minor repair and O&M projects, pictures should be provided before and after to the extent possible. Photos shall be provided as photo quality, 3x5 prints with a negative for each picture, and/or print quality electronic photos (digital images). A short description of the activity and names of those in the photos shall also be provided.

I. ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE

The ANTHC will provide the Denali Commission with an environmental review and recommendation for the project. If the sub-recipient or facility owner has completed a prior environmental review and/or archaeological investigation in accordance with other federal agencies' procedures, these reviews will be made available by the sub-recipient to ANTHC to assist with this process. The sub-recipient will cooperate with the ANTHC during the environmental review. The sub-recipient will be responsible for completing those items of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process that are identified as a sub-recipient responsibility by the ANTHC, such as obtaining required resolutions for disposition of cultural items and human remains and submitting a Coastal Zone questionnaire to the State Division of Governmental Coordination.

Before project construction begins, the ANTHC Environmental Review Officer will perform a review of existing information on known archaeological resources for the project construction site. If necessary, on-site field surveys may be performed to further evaluate the extent of and potential for any archaeological sites in the project area being adversely impacted. The on-site work and evaluation will be at project expense.

I 1. Archaeological Review and Discoveries

During the earliest possible phase of planning, the ANTHC Environmental Review Officer will perform a review of existing information on known archaeological resources located at the Office of History and Archaeology for all project construction sites. If necessary, and before project construction, a professional archaeologist will conduct a field survey at project expense. Three phases of archaeological work may be required, including the identification phase, the evaluation phase, and the treatment phase. The primary goal is to evaluate the extent and potential for any archaeological sites in the area of potential effect that may be adversely impacted.

All archaeological review and surveys shall take place in accordance with requirements of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966.

The sub-recipient will assist ANTHC in assuring compliance with Section 106 of the NHPA of 1966 as amended (16 U.S.C. 470), E.O. 11593 (identification and preservation of historic properties), and the Archeological and Historic Preservation Act of 1974 (16 U.S.C. 469-1 et seq). The sub-recipient will arrange for the project facility owner and any other project participants to allow and assist an archaeologist to survey the project site, if required, and will encourage individual homeowners to also cooperate.

The sub-recipient shall obtain from the appropriate and responsible authority and shall provide to ANTHC a duly executed resolution providing guidance on handling and disposing human remains and associated archaeological resources.

If there are any archaeological sites in the project construction area that are listed or are eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, and if any such known or discovered sites will be adversely impacted by construction, the construction methodology and/or design will be altered, wherever possible, to avoid or eliminate any such adverse impact, subject to ANTHC and Denali Commission approval.

If it is not physically possible or economically feasible to alter the construction methodology and/or design so as to totally avoid all adverse impacts to archaeological sites, avoidance and mitigation procedures will be developed in accordance with 36 CFR 800 in coordination with all concerned parties and government agencies subject to ANTHC and Denali Commission approval, to allow construction to proceed while minimizing loss of archaeological resources.

If, during construction, unanticipated sites, artifacts or human remains are uncovered, construction on that part of the project will be suspended until disposition of the archaeological resources can be made in accordance 36 CFR 800, subject to ANTHC and Denali Commission approval.

J. FUNDING TRANSFER

Denali Commission funding is provided through ANTHC to Sub-Award Recipients, via Financial Assistance Sub-Awards, in amounts and for purposes approved by the Denali Commission.

These awards shall specify financial amounts to be incrementally transferred to the sub-recipient and the amounts allocated to ANTHC cooperative efforts involving project planning, design, construction, construction management, or other project-related services.

K. RECORDS AND INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS

The ANTHC reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, for ANTHC, Denali Commission, or other Federal government purposes, project construction documents and as-built information and record drawings.

L. EFFECTIVE DATE OF CONSTRUCTION WARRANTY

Upon mutual consent, the final inspection and completion of punch list items will be followed by an Acknowledgement of Project Completion (AOPC) or a Letter of Beneficial Use (LOBU) signed by the parties to the Sub-Award and owner of the project facilities. The AOPC or LOBU will identify the party assuming operating responsibility and the effective date of construction warranty.

M. UTILIZATION OF LOCAL LABOR

To the maximum extent feasible, considering applicable laws, the sub-recipient shall accomplish the work of this Attachment utilizing local labor.

N. ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

The Sub-Award Recipient shall comply with provisions of the solicitation of applications, and all terms and conditions of the financial assistance application(s) for this project.

O. AGREEMENT

This project/service agreement for activities covered by this Attachment is entered into subject to terms and conditions of the Financial Assistance Sub-Award Project Number above, and as set forth in this Attachment.

**RESOLUTION__ . TRIBAL RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE FOR THE
 DISPOSITION OF CULTURAL ITEMS AND/OR ANCIENT HUMAN BURIALS,
 ASSOCIATED ITEMS, AND/OR ARCHAEOLOGICAL REMAINS**

RESOLUTION No. 02-14

WHEREAS, the Iqurmiut Traditional Council is a duly constituted Native American Tribe recognized by the Federal Government of the United States, and

WHEREAS, the Iqurmiut Traditional Council is the duly elected governing body of the Tribe, authorized to act by and on behalf of its members, and

WHEREAS, the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium, hereinafter called the ANTHC, in coordination with other parties, proposes to engage in construction of the health facility in Russian Mission, Alaska under ANTHC Project No. AN 02-G29 to provide for the improved health and welfare of the residents of Russian Mission, Alaska, and

WHEREAS, the requirements of the National Historic Preservation Act, hereinafter called NHPA, provide for cultural resources identification and protection through avoidance or mitigation to avoid unnecessary disturbance of reported or known human burials, and

WHEREAS, the NHPA requires Tribes to be consulting parties and contains stipulations regarding the appropriate treatment and disposition of human burials, associated items, and archaeological artifacts, and

WHEREAS, there is no known controversy anticipated with the proposed project and any known or reported ancient human burial, associated item, or archaeological site, and

WHEREAS, the excavation activities associated with construction may result in discovery of ancient cultural items (i.e. human burials, associated items, and archaeological artifacts), and

WHEREAS, it is in the interest of all parties concerned that there be no unnecessary delays in the completion of the construction of the sanitation facilities.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Iqurmiut Traditional Council expressly stipulates the following conditions for dispositions of and control over any and all cultural items discovered on all but private lands during construction of facilities by the ANTHC or other party to facility construction operations:

1. The Iqurmiut Traditional Council has the responsibility to identify any known or reported archaeological site, artifact, or ancient human remains to avoid unnecessary damage to sensitive resources.
2. Construction shall be delayed in the vicinity of the discovery until notification as per 36 CFR 800 is complete.
3. Appropriate mitigation measures shall be determined as per 36 CFR 800, and all mitigation shall be performed in conformance with 36 CFR 800.
4. An archaeologist, retained or employed by any party to facilitate construction operations, will view and document any and all cultural items discovered during excavation if an adverse effect determination has been made.
5. If removal of ancient human remains is necessary, the archaeologist shall remove the entire body. Unless the Iqurmiut Traditional Council requests further study of the remains, tests upon or photographs of any ancient human remains will not occur unless specific, separate Agreements have been made with the Iqurmiut Traditional Council.
6. If a modern human burial is discovered, the Village Public Safety Officer shall be contacted to determine if a criminal act can be identified. If the burial is from an archaeological context, the burial will be treated as archaeological remains and need not be treated as a scene of crime.
7. The Iqurmiut Traditional Council assumes full responsibility of any and all cultural items discovered during excavation, on all but private lands.
8. The Iqurmiut Traditional Council reserves the inherent right to determine the appropriate disposition of any and all cultural items discovered during excavation, on all but private lands.
9. The inherent claims or rights of the Iqurmiut Traditional Council are not diminished by the fact that the land is under ownership by another party.
10. If the discovery is made on Federal lands, Indian Allotment lands, or lands not yet conveyed to the Village or Regional Corporation, parties to facility construction operations shall comply with the Native American Graves Repatriation Act if appropriate.
11. All other inherent rights and claims regarding any and all cultural items discovered on any lands other than private lands during excavation for or in support of facility construction not expressly covered in this Resolution are reserved to the Iqurmiut Traditional Council alone.

12. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Iqurmiut Traditional Council Chief/President is hereby appointed the official representative for the Tribe for the purpose of implementing decision-making actions specified in this Resolution.

MEMORANDUM

TO: FOR THE RECORD

Based upon the scope for this project, an environmental review in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) has been completed. The Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium (ANTHC) has considered all potential environmental concerns (specific and cumulative effects) associated with the project in consultation with applicable federal, state, and local authorities. The Environmental Review Report has been completed and reviewed with respect to the proposed health facilities improvement project and is attached to this Memorandum.

FINDINGS

The ANTHC uses the Indian Health Service (IHS) environmental review procedures for conducting environmental analyses of all health facilities projects, as outlined in the *Environmental Review Manual*, the second edition of which was issued in January 2000. This environmental review finds that no further environmental investigation is necessary. All actions involving construction have been reviewed and no extraordinary or exceptional circumstances were found to exist. It is therefore recommended that the Denali Commission approve a determination of eligibility for categorical exclusion from the requirement to conduct further environmental evaluation for this project. Current IHS policy (Federal Register, Vol. 58, No. 3, January 6, 1993, pp. 569-572) allows for categorical exclusion of health and sanitation facility projects that do not have a significant impact on the environment, as determined by the attached "Environmental Review and Documentation."

BACKGROUND

Russian Mission is located on the west bank of the Yukon River in the Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta, 25 miles southeast of Marshall. It lies 70 air miles northeast of Bethel and 376 miles west of Anchorage. It lies at approximately 61° 47' N Latitude, 161° 19' W Longitude. (Sec. 31, T020N, R066W, Seward Meridian.)

The population of Russian Mission, as of December 2001, according to the Alaska Department of Community and Economic Development, was 296 people.

ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES OF IMPORTANCE

This project involves the construction of a new 2,000 square foot health clinic in Russian Mission in conjunction with the Iqurmiut Traditional Council. The selected site lies well within the established community boundaries ant the junction of Ayak Loop and Atsak Way. A literature review did not yield any information about known or reported archaeological sites in the vicinity of the proposed clinic. Moreover, the community has signed resolutions regarding the disposition of cultural material or human remains. For these reasons, the ANTHC has determined that no historic properties will be affected by this clinic, which will be built on pilings. This finding will be shared with the State Historic Preservation Officer for concurrence. There are no other environmental resources of importance identified that would sustain direct impacts from clinic construction.

SCOPE OF WORK

This project will construct a new health clinic facility in the City of Russian Mission, Alaska. The scope of this project includes design and planning, site preparation, materials and equipment, construction, and labor.

PROPOSED MITIGATION MEASURES

Given the environmental review performed by the ANTHC, no mitigation activities are proposed for this project.


SUMMARY

The Russian Mission will be responsible for ensuring that final design plans for health facilities will be submitted to the appropriate federal and state agencies for review and approval. In addition, the community of Russian Mission, Alaska is responsible for compliance with all applicable federal, state and local environmental laws, regulations, and requirements during all phases of the project, and for obtaining all necessary construction permits.

In any discovery situation of cultural items and/or human remains encountered during the course of the project, the ANTHC shall direct the community to stop construction activity in the area of discovery. The community shall further be directed to notify the ANTHC and the Denali Commission to pursue appropriate steps with the State Historic Preservation Officer for developing an acceptable course of action prior to resuming construction activities in the impacted area.

In the event of any other unforeseen discovery which could change the environmental determination, the community shall be directed to notify the appropriate authority, the ANTHC, and the Denali Commission to develop an acceptable course of action prior to resuming construction activities in the impacted area.

With the scope of work outlined in the Financial Assistance Sub-Award, the ANTHC has completed the environmental review. If the scope of work is changed in the future, then the community and the ANTHC will revisit this environmental review to determine if potential environmental concerns have been addressed.




