***1. Scope of Work***

**Abstract**

The Institute of Social and Economic Research (ISER) researchers will conduct a review and compilation of existing studies and data sources relating to the economic and social viability of remote rural Alaska communities. Special emphasis will be placed on the interactions among fuel costs, the overall cost of living, and migration. Key gaps in both knowledge and primary data will be identified. Work products include a technical report with narrative, an annotated listing of studies and data, and a powerpoint presentation suitable for policy-makers.

**Problem Statement**

Recent rapid increases in fuel costs have focused attention on several questions relating to the viability of remote rural communities in Alaska. These questions relate immediately to a perceived increase in migration rates from smaller communities to larger places. The questions include the following:

- Are more people migrating out of villages in recent years than previously?
- If so, who is moving, to where, and why?
- Specifically, are people migrating out of villages due largely to high fuel costs?
- What other factors may be causing migration?
- How are fuel costs affecting subsistence participation?
- How are high fuel costs affecting the viability of local governments, utilities, and local businesses?
- Are there major factors – other than fuel costs -- affecting community viability and migration, such as lack of employment?
- Do regional patterns emerge? Can data be collected and reported regionally?

Some of these questions may be answerable with existing knowledge. Others may require new research – both analysis of existing data and gathering new data. In particular, it is hard to get at the motivations underlying peoples' behavior without using survey methods, including benchmark data (such as the 2007 Attitudinal Survey conducted by the Alaska Native Policy Center).

**Purpose of this research**

ISER will take stock of the knowledge base relating to rural-urban migration, fuel costs and their relationship to the overall cost of living, and larger questions of community viability.

ISER's methodology will be a review of existing literature and data sources, with special emphasis on the gray literature and unconventional or untapped data sources. (Conventional, ongoing data sources were recently catalogued by the Alaska Native Policy Center (2007) for the Denali Commission).

The term "knowledge base" means three things: 1) existing studies; 2) existing data sources; and 3) well-defined possibilities for collecting additional data. An example of an existing study is the ISER report on sustainable utilities for rural Alaska (Colt et al. 2003). An example of an existing data source is the Alaska Permanent Fund dividend applications database showing changes in the addresses of applicants. An example of a well-defined possibility would be to re-interview selected, known, respondents to a previous survey, such as the Survey of Living Conditions in the Arctic or SLiCA (Poppel et al. 2007).

### **Work plan**

The work plan includes 6 tasks.

**Task 1.** Assemble, compile, and summarize existing studies. Particular attention will be paid to recent work and work that may not have been formally published, such as the SLiCA results noted above.

**Task 2.** Document and describe key existing data sources. These include sources such as the U.S. Census that may already be in common use (but may be changing as to coverage and timeliness), sources that may not be recognized as directly relating to community viability (such as school district budget data showing utility expenses, and sources that are not publicly available but could be used by an agency such as the Denali Commission with appropriate lead time.

**Task 3.** Document and describe clear gaps in the knowledge base.

**Task 4.** Draft a technical report to include a short synthesis narrative that discusses what we do and don't know about fuel costs, living costs, migration, and community viability. The report will also include a compendium of all studies and data sources developed in tasks 1 and 2, with a "one-page-per-study" annotated listing of these works.

**Task 5.** Based on the previous work, create a clear powerpoint presentation, including notes, suitable for policy-makers such as Denali Commission members and legislators.

**Task 6.** Present the powerpoint in Juneau to one or two audiences.

### **Deliverables and timetable**

The following timetable is based on receiving a firm notice to proceed by 15 December 2007. If an NTP is not possible by this date, the timetable will need to be discussed and possibly adjusted.

1. Technical report including synthesis narrative and annotated listing of all studies and data sources used, and also including specific data gaps. To be delivered in pdf format: Fri, March 7.
2. Draft powerpoint presentation with full notes (sufficient to allow the slides to be reviewed without the speaker present). To be delivered in powerpoint format: Thursday, February 21.
3. Presentation of draft powerpoint to Denali Commission staff for review and comment. To be delivered at Denali Commission Anchorage office: Friday, February 22.
3. Presentation of powerpoint at Denali Commission meeting in Juneau: Thursday or Friday, February 28 or 29 (depending on agenda).

Project level environmental reviews in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) are required for each project undertaken with Denali Commission funds.

### **10. *Non-Compliance with Award Conditions***

Recipients not in compliance with the terms and conditions of this Financial Assistance Award will be notified in writing by the Denali Commission and will be given at least thirty days to remedy the compliance violations. The Denali Commission will work with

the recipient to identify the steps necessary to bring them back into compliance, and will establish an appropriate time frame for the corrections to be made. If the corrections have not been made by the deadline, the Denali Commission reserves the right to either suspend or unilaterally terminate the Financial Assistance Award for non-performance.
