1. Scope of Work

This document establishes the Scope of Work for the financial assistance award made by the Denali Commission (hereinafter referred to as the Commission) to Alaska Works Partnership, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as AWP).

AWP agrees to conduct construction, maintenance and operation training in rural Alaska for a total of \$591,723.00 for the period March 1, 2008 – June 30, 2008 in the following strategies:

Rural Apprenticeship Outreach (AO)

Apprenticeship Outreach staff develop and distribute timely information about current apprenticeship opportunities available to rural Alaskans. Staff attends rural career fairs, and responds to individuals who attend career fairs, visit AWP offices, or phone, mail and e-mail requests for information. Staff assist individuals prepare their applications and gather the required documents, and help them with a variety of services such as travel, housing and meals to attend interview skills training and interviews with apprenticeship committees, driver's education training and adult basic education courses.

Deliverables for Apprenticeship Outreach:

- 100 persons will request assistance – 40 will apply for apprenticeship
- 30 applicants will be assisted with travel for interviews & interview skills training
- 20 applicants will be accepted into trade apprenticeship
- AO representatives will attend 6 rural job/career fairs
- 10 applicants will be referred to driver's education or adult education services.

Building Maintenance Repairer Apprenticeship Program (BMR)

BMR apprentices are primarily employed by Tribal Designated Housing Entities, general contractors working in rural Alaska, and community developers such as tribal health and village administrative entities. Current BMR apprentices live in the North Slope Borough, Northwest Alaska, Western Alaska, South Western Alaska, South Central, and Southeast Alaska. The BMR apprenticeship program involves many activities necessary to operate a registered apprenticeship program. Activities include recruiting apprentices, maintaining on-the-job training agreements with employers, scheduling required courses, logistics for instructors, classroom and shop space, ordering instruction materials (texts, tools, consumables), arranging transportation and lodging for BMR apprentices attending training and for instructors, transporting instruction materials to training sites, tracking all

courses apprentices complete, issuing certificates, maintaining a record of all on-the-job training, promoting and expanding the program, and assisting apprentices with continued employment and career advancement.

Deliverables for BMR Program:

- 60 BMR apprentices (new & continuing) will attend apprentice courses
- 90% (56) will be employed after training
- Of those trained 15 will be new apprentices (1st year BMR).

Rural Job Training

AWP's Job Developer works with employers and communities to develop recruitment and training plans for rural infrastructure projects. These projects include schools, roads, airports, special needs housing, clinics and other community buildings. AWP staff will travel to communities where projects are to recruit workers and offers the training needed for the specific type of project. The AWP job developer will facilitate employment training opportunities for the following projects:

1. New Homes: Dillingham, Kokhanok, Igiugig, Hooper Bay, Copper River.
2. New Schools or Renovations: Russian Mission, Kokhanok, Kongiganak
3. Roads: Kokhanok, Kongiganak
4. Fish Plant: Goodnews Bay
5. Pipeline Welder helpers: Bering Straits & Calista Regions
6. General construction projects in several southeast communities

Deliverables for Rural Job Training:

- 40 or more individuals will be trained for jobs on a rural infrastructure projects
- 80% of those trained (32) will be employed as a result of training.

All Commission funding is intended for use for the scope of work identified in the Award document only. Any balance of funds remaining after the full scope of work has been completed will be returned to the Commission.

2. Milestones

The following milestones are identified as the major steps to be completed as part of the project. "Planned" dates for the first milestone are included here. As part of each progress report, recipients shall update the progress toward meeting these milestones (see section 7, Reporting).

3. Award Performance Period

The Award performance period is March 1, 2008 through June 30, 2008. This is the period during which Award recipients can incur obligations or costs against this Award.

4. Direct and Indirect Costs

Please include an expense report that correlates with the submitted SF-270. **No interest will be accrued on these funds.**

7. Reporting

Two forms of project reporting are required under this Award, listed below. Alaska Works Partnership, Inc. shall submit reports using the Commission's on-line Project Database System, available at www.denali.gov. If there are technical limitations which may prevent the recipient from meeting this requirement, please contact the Program Manager listed in this agreement.

- a. **Progress Reports** shall be submitted on a quarterly basis. The first reporting period is March 1, 2008 to June 30, 2008 and quarterly thereafter. Reports are due within 30 days of the end of the reporting period. Progress reports shall include the following:

- i. Total project funding, including both Commission funding and other project funding sources.
 - ii. The total project expenditures for the project as of the end of the reporting period, including both Commission and Other funding sources.
 - iii. Updated schedule and milestone information as identified in the Scope of Work.
 - iv. Narrative summary of the project status and accomplishments to date, any problems, overruns and delays, including any type of litigation related to the project, and address the following questions: is the project on schedule, is the project on budget, and what actions are planned to address any project problems.
 - v. For minor repair and renovation projects or other non-construction projects, dated pictures should be provided of before and after, or photos that are representative of the funded activity, to the extent possible. Photos shall be provided in a digital format as part of the on-line report. A short description of the activity and names of those in the photos shall also be provided.
- b. **Federal Single Audits** shall be submitted annually, when required. In accordance with OMB Circular A-133, which requires [subpart 200] "Non-Federal entities that expend \$500,000 or more in a year in Federal awards shall have a single or program-specific audit conducted for that year in accordance with the provisions of this part [subpart 205]. The determination of when an award is expended should be based on when the activity related to the award occurs."

8. Project/Award Close-Out

The project close-out report shall be completed within 90 days of the end of the Award performance period or within 90 days of the completion of the project, whichever is earlier. Recipients must also draw down any remaining funds for expenditures incurred under this award during this 90-day period.

The project close-out report shall be submitted on-line through the Commission's on-line Project Database System, available at www.denali.gov. The project close out will require the recipient to submit the following information:

- a. Final data for each item listed in paragraph 7(a) "Progress Reports."
- b. Final project expenditures itemized by the following categories: planning & design; materials & equipment; freight; labor; project administration/overhead; and other expenses.

- c. Acknowledgement of support: For all non-construction projects, the Award recipient shall include an acknowledgement of the Government's support for the project(s) developed under this Award. The format for acknowledgement of the Government's support for non-construction awards will vary with each award and must be agreed upon between the Award recipient and the Commission Project Manager. Costs associated with this requirement shall be paid out of the project funding received by the Award recipient from the Commission.

9. Public Policy Laws and Assurances
